Please note that the Security Council only includes 15 countries: 5 permanent members and 10 non-permanent members. The permanent members are: China, France, the Russian Federation, the United Kingdom, and the United States. The permanent members have a veto power only on the Security Council. The 10 non-permanent members for 2011 are: Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Colombia, Gabon, Germany, India, Lebanon, Nigeria, Portugal, and South Africa.

Also note that the G20 includes: Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Republic of Korea, Turkey, United Kingdom, and the United States of America (with the European Union as the 20th member).
